God's Word: Sweet or Bitter?


"You can catch more flies with honey than with vinegar."

The first known instance of this familiar proverb was a book, *Common Places of Italian Proverbs*, dated 1666. Ben Franklin later introduced it in the United States in his book *Poor Richard's Almanac* (1744). "Catching flies" represents desired accomplishments. Honey (sweet) is more desirable than vinegar (sour) in attaining the goal. Success is achieved by being nice rather than by being rude and hateful.

In two instances recorded in the Bible, God told one of His servants to eat His word. The prophet Ezekiel was instructed to *eat this roll*, which he did, describing it as *honey for sweetness* (Ezek. 2:9-3:3). Centuries later, John the apostle was given a similar instruction in his vision. He was told to eat the book which would be bitter in his stomach, but sweet in his mouth (Rev. 10:8-10). The question arises: Is God's word sweet or bitter – or both? The answer is both. The commands and promises are sweet to those who love God and are truly interested in doing His will and in pleasing Him. However, the same words are bitter to those who do not love God and are not interested in pleasing Him.

Consider this: The same sun which melts wax also hardens clay. The word of God accomplishes His will (**Isa. 55:11**) because it saves those who find it sweet and it condemns those who find it bitter. Let us always search for and find sweetness in the word of God.
